

# Use the Exit Card to evaluate your students understanding

### What is an Exit Card?

A card that includes a question to be asked to all students at the end of the lecture/week/unit. The exit card is no more than one or two short, open-ended questions (if possible) that take less than 5 minutes for students to complete.

### Tips for using the exit card

- Use digital tools such as Google Forms, Menimeter tools, or Poll everywhere to create an exit card that is easy to distribute, collect, and view online; Digital exit cards are practical for large numbers of students.
- Do not require students to mention their names on the exit cards to encourage credibility in their responses.
- Share with students their responses in previous lectures.
- Discuss with the students how to provide good feedback; some of them may not have experience with the feedback concept.
- You can reuse exit tickets after you have saved student responses.
